Mrs. Morris Getz of Altoona, first vice president of the South Central District, of PTA, who spoke on Parliamentary Procedure said "Parliamentary Procedure is one of the most interesting of the many phases of the PTA work. A well planned and properly presented meeting should be the ultimate goal of every president."

She further stated that Parliamentary law is an accepted set of rules. We of the PTA have as our authority Roberts Rules of Order, Revised. No parent-teacher association can be any better than its program, for it is the program which points the way toward success in accomplishing the objects toward which all parent-teacher groups work. The program chairman is vital.

In the absence of George Muller of McConnellsburg, treasurer of the South Central District, Mrs. Rupp, county council president, spoke on the importance of a budget as a guide. She explained the budget of the county council for last year as an example of the importance of compiling and applying a budget.

The County President also spoke at the afternoon session on "Presidents, Use the Experienced Members of Your PTA Units." She urged unit presidents to ask help of past presidents and other former officials and county council officers, asking them to serve as chairmen of standing committees or parliamentarians.

The announcement was made that the County Council meets the second Thursday of the following months: September, Cooper Township, Winburne; November, Moshannon Joint, Madera; March, Leonard Grade School; and May, place to be announced. It also was pointed out that the president and two delegates have right to vote on matters of the work of the County Council at its regular meetings. However, all members of local PTA units are urged to attend these meetings.
