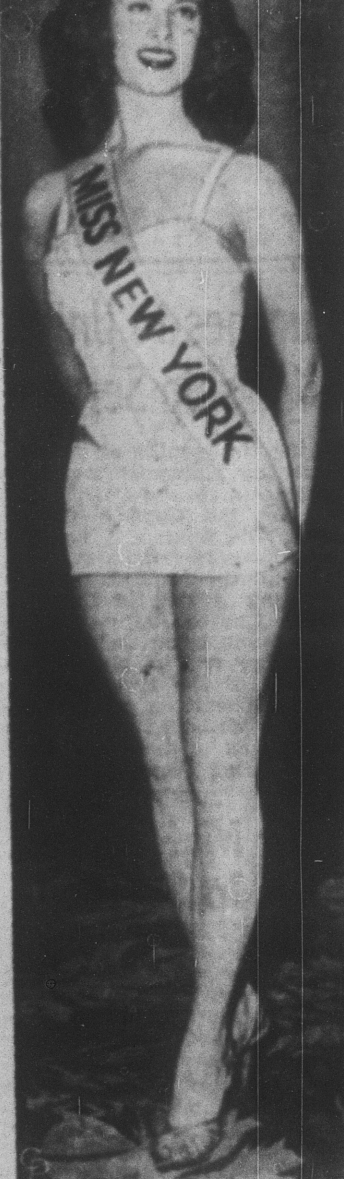

Uphold Court Rule In Strip Coal Case

A Cambria County Court verdict in the case of Walter J. Seanon and son, Cresson, against Lawrence Sherbine, Wilmore, was upheld by the State Supreme Court in Philadelphia Monday.

The Seanons were awarded a judgement of \$16,853 against the Wilmore man in a case involving 242 acres of coal land in Clearfield Township. The Seanons alleged that Sherbine had strip mined 15,000 tons of coal from their property after his lease had expired.

Sherbine appealed the verdict. In an opinion written by Justice John C. Arnold, the county court verdict was upheld and the costs of the appeal were placed on Sherbine.

J. Dean Whited, Barnesboro chief of police, has been elected as chief of the newly-organized Civil Defense and Emergency Police of North Cambria County.
