Dr. L. A. Wesner Named As New Co. Medical Head
Former Superintendent Of Cresson Sanatorium
Appointment of Dr. Louis A. Wesner of Johnstown as Cambria County medical director has been announced by the State Department of Health.

The veteran physician succeeds Dr. E. Pope Dickinson of St. Michael, who resigned last week after serving since September of 1939.
In his part-time position, Dr. Wesner will receive an annual salary of \$1,596. He assumed his new duties last Friday.

Dr. Wesner, who has been practicing in Johnstown for 40 years, served for a number of years as superintendent of the Cresson State Sanatorium.
The new county director was graduated from Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia, in 1916. He is a son of the late Dr. Michael A. Wesner and Annie (Walters) Wesner and attended Johnstown public schools and St. Vincent College before entering medical school. During his high school days he was an outstanding athlete and in later years served two years as track coach at the Johnstown High School.

During his term as medical director, Dr. Dickinson supervised the administration of Salk anti-polio vaccine to thousands of Cambria County children.

New 3-Prong Plug Protects User from Electrical Shock

Code Requires Plastic Pipe Grounding Change
A three-pronged electric plug that grounds electrical equipment and appliances automatically has been approved by the National Electric Code. It is designed to prevent electrocution or shock caused by short circuits.

Everyone planning to build or remodel should install proper outlets and wiring cable so that the three-pronged plug may be used with electrical equipment, as provided in the Code, urged Jack Lange, farm supervisor of the Harrisburg Division, Pennsylvania Power and Light Company.
Cooperating with the inventors, Farm and Home Safety Education, Department of Public Instruction, in reducing accidents, Lange urged everyone to contact their power representatives for details.
"This cable contains a third wire, known as a grounding wire, in addition to the regular neutral and hot wires," explained Mr. Lange. "The third, or grounding, prong on the plug connects equipment to this grounding wire and automatically grounds the equipment. The service entrance grounding wire is connected to the water system or to a suitable driven ground. Thus every piece of equipment is automatically grounded when it is plugged in and its separate ground wire is needed for each appliance."
Mr. Lange has this word of caution on safe ground connections: "Where the well goes dry occasionally or where plastic pipe is used anywhere in the water system, safety demands that the grounding wire be connected to the driven ground rather than the water system. It is wise to inform your electrician of any such conditions, so he can make his installation as safe as possible."
Frayed wires or loose connections or wearing off of insulation on winding inside motor can all cause short circuits, Mr. Lange declared. This means dangerous current on the loose, looking for a place to go. It will go through persons and livestock, with fatal results, unless it finds an easier path to the ground. The three-pronged plug and grounding wire provides this easier path and helps to insure safety.
Every piece of equipment in the home or on the farm should be grounded for safety of people and livestock, the farm supervisor emphasized. He stated that all portable equipment like hay and grain elevators and other tools, can now be automatically grounded, if this modern wiring is installed.

Three Mining Bills Passed Tuesday By State House

Blasting Procedures, Inspections Affected
The State House of Representatives Tuesday in Harrisburg passed and sent to the Senate three coal mining bills relating to blasting procedures and inspections.
The blasting procedure bill would prohibit explosions in anthracite mines until the roof and sides of the mine are properly secured by props, timber or roof bolts to insure a safe working area.
The limitation would not apply to a working area 12 feet or less in width where props, timber or roof bolts have not been used previously.
The proposal was approved 129-32.
Another bill, passed 109-50 would require foremen of bituminous mines to employ a sufficient number of assistants to insure a visit to each working place at least twice in the first five hours of each working shift. At present the law requires a visit only once during each shift.
A bill passed unanimously would increase the number of bituminous mine inspections required each year. At present an inspector must examine each mine in his district a minimum of once every four months.
Under the proposal the minimum would be once every three months.
Operation of a portable mining machine in the bituminous mine without a motorman and an assistant would have been declared illegal under another bill declared 101-57. It needed five more votes to pass.
In addition it would have provided that any portable mining machine be equipped with a standard permittable lighting system.
Sponsors of the measure are Louis Rozusek (D-Cambria) and C. O. Williams (D-Washington).
