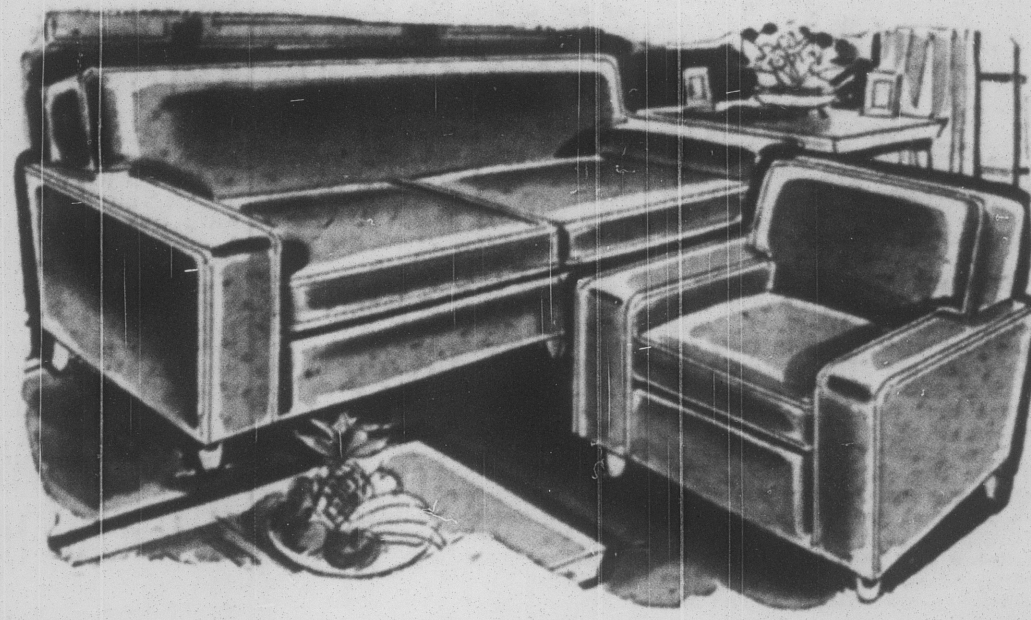

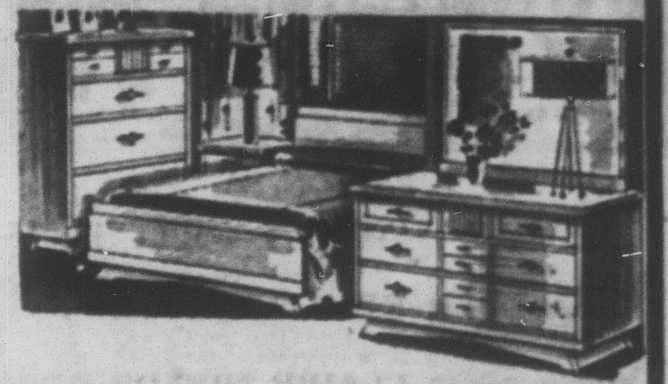

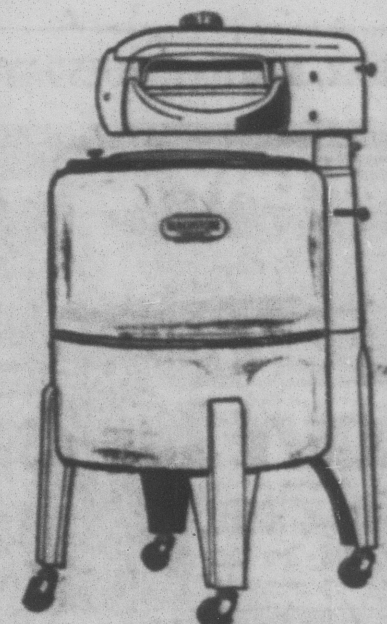

Increase Sought In Bond to Guarantee Strip Mine Filling

Harrisburg—Administration legislation "to protect our children" by sharpening provisions in the Strip Mining Law was introduced in the House on Monday night.

One of the bills would increase from \$300 to \$600 per acre the bond required of anthracite strip mining operators to insure their compliance with the law's backfill requirements.

Rep. Louis Rovaneck (D-Cambria), House Mines Committee vice chairman, pointed out that the anthracite bill was similar to a measure dealing with the bituminous area introduced earlier in the session, also with administration support.

"At present the bonds are too tight and some of the operators do not come back and fill in the holes," Rovaneck said. "We feel that if the bond is heavy enough they'll come back and fill up."

He said the measures also were intended to erase hazards to the children in the coal belts. "We feel the laws are needed to protect children since many have been injured by falling into these holes," he said.

The bill raising the anthracite strip mining bond was co-sponsored by Democratic Reps. Mi-

chael J. Needham and Joseph G. Wargo of Lackawanna County. Rovaneck, who is a coal miner, and Rep. C. O. Williams (D-Washington), House Mines Committee Chairman, co-sponsored two other administration measures introduced Monday and intended to plug loopholes in strip mining laws.

One of these would require bituminous strip operators to file "a map on a scale of 100 feet to the inch" showing the exact location of their operations.

Rovaneck said this bill grew out of conferences between operators and state Mines Department officials, and has the support of both.

"Quite a few of the operators have been bargaining in on one another and their property," he declared. "This bill is to protect the operators so they don't have any battles among themselves."

Another measure would require that a bituminous operator who continues to work one area for more than a year be required to file a new map of his operations at the end of each year.

Rovaneck said this was intended to prevent bituminous operators "from taking out more coal than they lease."
