David Slear of Greensburg, governor of Rotary District 262, was guest speaker at Tuesday evening's meeting of the Hastings club in Demento's Restaurant.

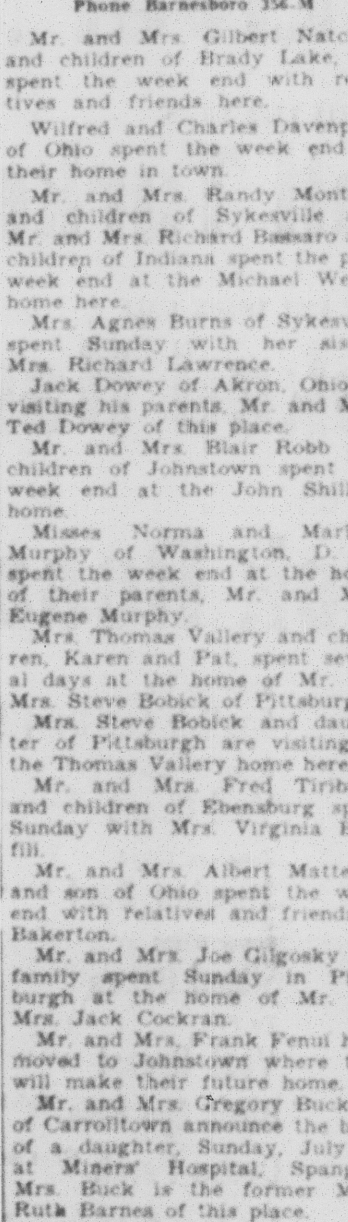
He spoke on Rotary International's 50th anniversary year and discussed plans for the coming year. One of the main objectives, the district governor said, is the development of manpower in Rotary.

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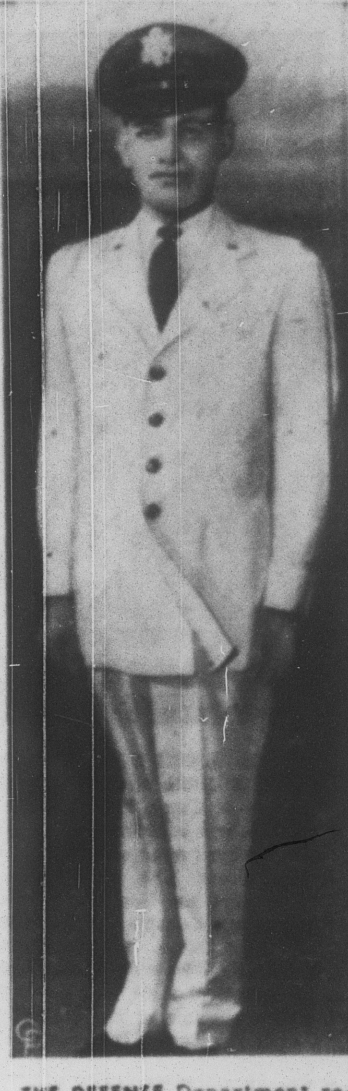
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U.S.A.F. Uniform
