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Record List of Exhibitors to Feature Bedford County Fair 82nd Annual Event to Open Monday, Aug. 8; Tournament of Thrills to Lead Off Entertainment

Marked by a beautiful Grandstand Revue, the largest list of exhibitors in fair history, and new special events, the 82nd annual Bedford Fair will attract crowds of fairgoers from a 100-mile radius when the gates of Western Pennsylvania's fastest growing fair swing open Monday, Aug. 8, for a week-long exposition.

Bedford Fair's Tournament of Thrills will pry open the fair on Monday night, with an entirely new and different version of the ever-popular thrill show Auto Daredevil from three different angles, the serious fun of honours in each stunt—each striving to outdo the other in breathtaking stunts with autos and motorcycles.

In the climax three teams will make the death-defying aerial leap, each trying for a new distance record as cars hurtle into space.

Featuring the chorus of precision dancers, George A. Hamill's grandstand band will appear nightly, Tuesday through Saturday, in the beautiful "Stairway to the Stars."

Performers, who will present vaudeville acts each afternoon and combine with the night show for the evening show, include Mr. Ralph, the boy with the teddy bear who comes to America for the first time after triumph in Continental Europe.

More than 80,000 free tickets have been distributed by the Bedford Fair to school children in Bedford, Blair, Fulton and Cambria counties, providing free admission Tuesday and Friday, as well as opportunities to win a host of prizes.

Children's Day on Tuesday, Aug. 8, will feature the presentation of prizes, grand prize being a pony, completely bridled and saddled and bikes for other winners.

Tuesday will open with the annual Bedford Horse Show beginning at 10:30 a. m. In the afternoon, three fast harness races will be run, as well as a special pony race.

On the midway, all week will be Prell's Shows, with a wide diversity of shows and rides. A big new event will be added to the Bedford Fair this year, with U. S. Army Field Band.

The concert by the far-famed U. S. Army Field Band will follow Wednesday afternoon during the fair's first "Band Day." Bands from more than one dozen nearby high schools have accepted invitations to participate.

Thursday is always the "Big Day" at the fair, and as usual it will be crowded with special events leading off with the annual Horse Show Pitching Contest at 10:00 a. m.

The Cavalcade of all prize-winning livestock in front of the grandstand will take place at 1:00 p. m. Fine harness races will spark an afternoon of circus acts and special attractions.

In the evening the Hamid Revue, Frisky has been designed as Blair County Day, and once again all children will be admitted free. Another set of prizes, including a pony and two bicycles, will be given away at the close of the afternoon program.

The second 4-H Tractor Driving Contest will start at 10:00 a. m., with the winner to compete at Penn State University with others of the South Central Pennsylvania Division.

The booklet concludes: "Now that you have read this book you know that fallout is not the mysterious killer you may have been led to believe. You know what it can do and its limitations and how to protect yourself. But this knowledge will be of little value unless you do something about it. If you prepare your home and family, educate others, and most of all, volunteer for civil defense, you will be ready for the prompt effective action that could mean the difference between life and death in an emergency."

Ebensburg Firm Awaiting Contract For Defense Work

Government defense orders totaling \$190,760 have been awarded Stevens Manufacturing Company of Ebensburg.

George H. Lesak, firm president, Wednesday said orders have been received from the Navy Department for production of several hundred thousand practice bombs and several hundred thousand aero bomb slugs.

Production of the bombs is expected to get under way within four to six weeks, he said. The plant will be turning out bomb slugs in from two to three weeks.

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New Booklet Continues Campaign To Inform Public of Atomic Fallout

Simple Precautions Could Save Your Life

Continuing its campaign to educate Americans on how to protect themselves against the threat of fallout in a nuclear attack, the Federal Civil Defense Administration has published a new booklet which provides detailed instructions on how individuals and families may save themselves.

More than 2,000,000 copies of the Public Booklet, entitled "What You Should Know About Radioactive Fallout," PA-7, are being distributed throughout the nation. In addition, they may be purchased from the U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., for 10 cents.

This is the second in a series of FCDA publications designed to reduce the "mystery" surrounding fallout in the public mind, to put the threat in its proper perspective, and to show that there are simple precautions which can save lives. The Agency on May 22 announced distribution of the first publication of the series, a pamphlet entitled "Facts About Fallout," of which 3,000,000 copies were made available.

The latest publication supplements the first by providing more detailed information and instructions, and, like the pamphlet, is presented in simple, readable style.

In its introduction, the booklet declares: "The purpose of this book is to present in nontechnical language what you should know about fallout. It explains what causes fallout and where and when it might be expected. It reassures you that, far from being a mysterious killer, fallout is something about which our Government knows quite a bit, and something you can protect yourself from."

It describes the characteristics of an H-bomb explosion, the formation of the fallout cloud, the fallout patterns and tells who might be affected, then, in 16 pages, tells the ways in which citizens may protect themselves.

Here the booklet says: "There is a defense against radioactive fallout. It is not com-
