Miss Bowman was selected for the honor at the eighth annual picnic of Cambria County Young Republicans on Monday in Patton Community Park.

A 1955 graduate of Rende Township High School, Mount Airie, she won the title in August, 1954, at the Young Republicans' State convention in Harrisburg.

Judges were Dominick Genovese, Johnstown Downtown Club, county president; Attorney Richard Green, Jr., Westmont-Southmont Club; and William Tibbott, Barnesboro Club.

Mr. Genovese and Attorney Lawrence L. Davis, Johnstown, were selected to represent the group in a television debate with members of the Young Democrats of Cambria County.

The debate will be televised by WJAC-TV at 4:30 p. m. Aug. 27. Panel members will discuss their reasons for taking an active part in politics.

Attorney Davis was named chairman of a nominating committee to select candidates for election at the annual convention Oct. 1 in Blandburg.

The Young GOP campaign committee will discuss plans for the fall election at a meeting Aug. 15, in GOP headquarters in Johnstown.
