

Gridiron Schedules Released By Six District High Schools

First Games Set Sept. 9-10; New Names Listed On Cards

Patton, John Carroll, Hastings, North Cambria, Cresson, Ebensburg-Cambria All to Open At Home

Officials of six area high schools today released complete 1955 schedules for the coming football season.

Four of the schools announced varsity schedules, one varsity and junior varsity cards, and another varsity, B team and junior high 1955 cards.

Fans will note that all night games on all the schedules will be played at 8:00 p. m. unless otherwise designated. The schedules follow:

PATTON-CHEST
Patton-Chest Twp. High will play a nine-game schedule this year. The Panthers, under direction of Steve Bakajza and Melvin Brown, will play four games at home and five away.

Reynoldsville is the only new team on the 1955 card.

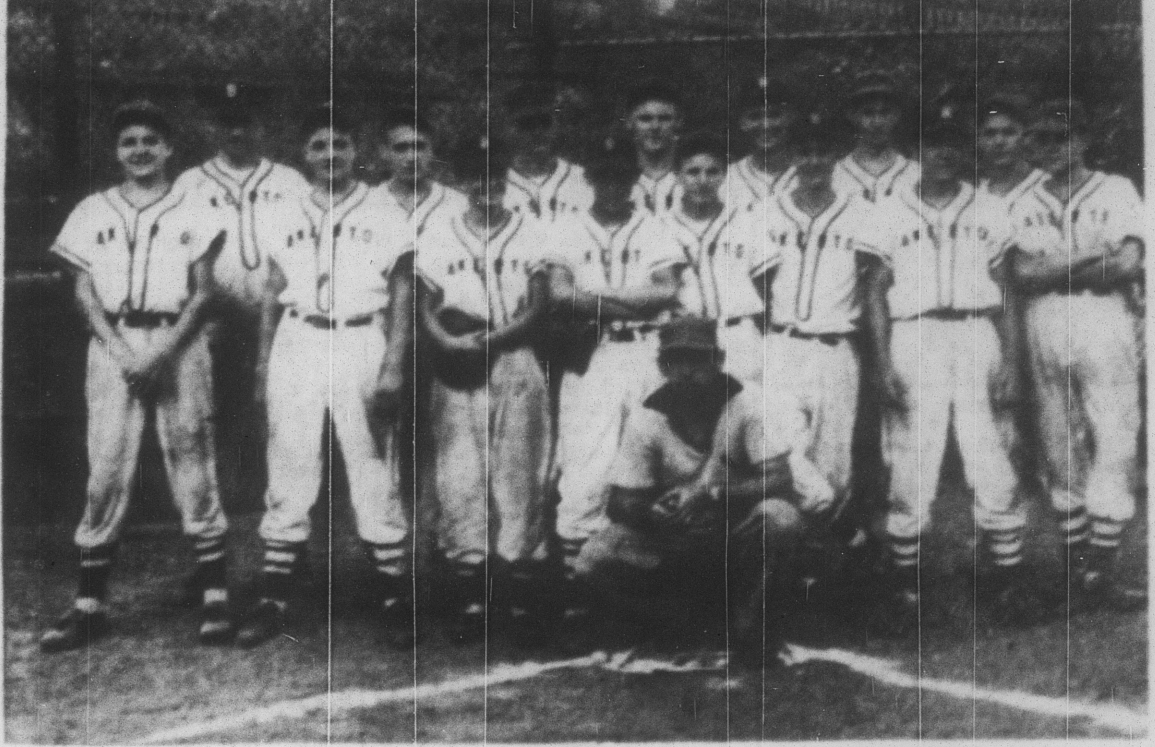
A game with Penn Manor Jt. originally set with Pine Twp. at home Sept. 17, will be played the same day at Clymer with the new joint school. The schedule:

School's Open, Drive Carefully, Motor Club Says

The eye-catching red and black poster will be the major "tool" that the motor club will use in bringing the opening of school to the attention of motorists.

"The two principal things that motorists should do in connection with the campaign," Mr. Davis said, "is to scrupulously obey special speed limits around schools and be extra alert for young children who are not yet safety-wise daring into the street at unexpected places."

"During the school year, the motor club official added, "the club will work with school officials to train children in safe walking habits, but past experience has shown that it takes time to really fix safety in the minds of new students. Meanwhile it's the motorist's responsibility to watch out for children—even if the children are at fault."

Mr. Davis also asked motorists to give every cooperation to School Safety Patrol boys and girls. "These volunteer safety guardians are on duty to protect their schoolmates and to see that it is safe, and their job can be much easier and effective if motorists learn to recognize them, and cooperate with them," he added.

"Throughout the country, the safety record for school children has been very good during the past years, but these first few weeks after school opens are critical ones. Children will learn more about traffic safety in school lessons, but meanwhile motorists will be doing a great service to the community if they will drive carefully," he concluded.

EFFICIENCY INCREASED

Charlson's knotted the count when Fye reached first on Kotrick's error, stole second and then scored on Yurko's single.

The winning run was scored by Pitcher Mike Zeanechok who went to first when Innocenti

HOME QUIZ

Query: When putty is used to cover nail holes, how do I keep the putty from turning lighter than the wood.

Answer: It is not the putty that lightens, but the wood which darkens. To avoid light putty spots on wood paneled walls, darken the putty with oil paints a few shades deeper than the wood to which it will be applied. This will be unattractive for awhile but it will not take the wood long to deepen to the same color as the putty.

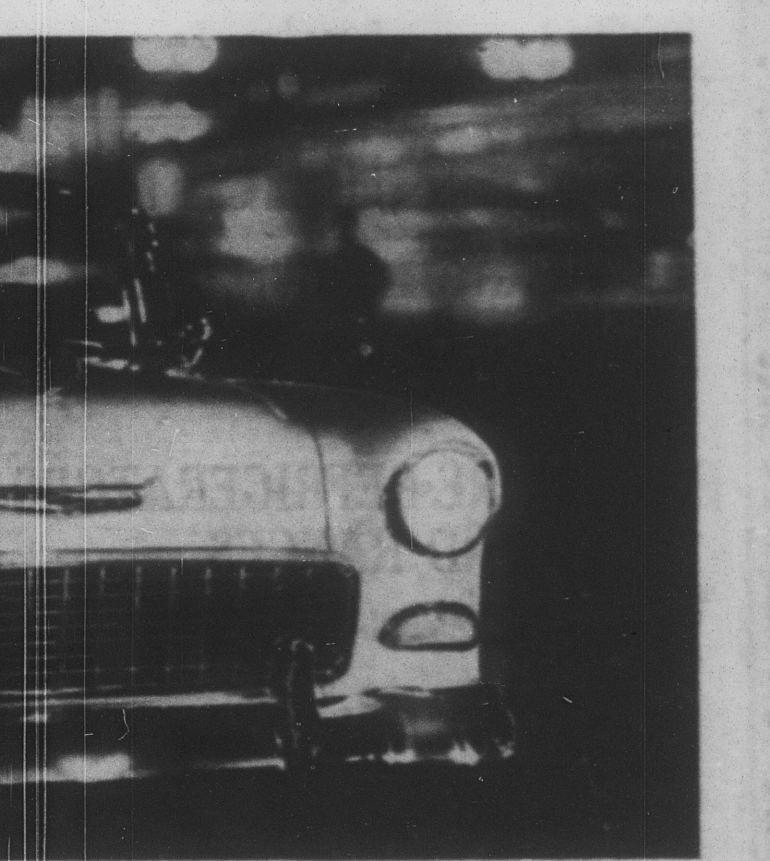
