Retail Milk Prices In Stores to Be 1¢ Lower Come Sept. 1

Home Delivery Cost Will Go Up Penny

The State Milk Control Commission last Thursday issued tentative orders establishing a statewide store differential of a cent a quart below the home-delivered price, effective Sept. 1. The commission issued the order affecting the marketing of milk in the York, Lancaster, Reading, Williamsport, Pottsville and Johnstown areas, where there is currently no store differential. A tentative order for the Harrisburg area was issued Wednesday. The price for home delivered milk in all areas will go up a cent a quart Sept. 1 under the commission's regular seasonal pricing program. Purpose of the fall and winter increase is to stimulate farmers into heavier milk production in those months, rather than in the spring and summer when milk supplies are plentiful.

MATERNITY

The action inaugurating a store differential throughout the state follows recommendations made last spring by Gov. Leader. "I am gratified to see that the commission has seen fit to promulgate these new orders which I feel are a big step in the right direction," the Governor said in commenting on the tentative price plan. At the same time, following the pattern set by its Harrisburg tentative plan, the commission ruled that institutions averaging more than 520 quarts of milk a day were entitled to a 5 1/2-cent discount per quart under the regular retail price. This was another move called for by the Governor in the spring. He declared at the time that institutions, especially state and state-affiliated institutions, were entitled to a cheaper rate for quantity use. Previously, institutions received a 1 1/2-cent discount per quart. Following the Governor's letter, the commission held hearings in a number of cities aimed at seeking means to carry out the Governor's suggestions.
