### Martin C. Kirsch Resigns As N. C. Joint School Chairman

#### Penn State May Again Offer Mining Courses

North Cambria Joint School Committee last Thursday night accepted the resignation of its chairman, Martin C. Kirsch of Spangler.

Mr. Kirsch, who has headed the committee since its organization and the formation of the joint school system, gave no reason for his resignation. He tendered his resignation at the close of the session in Spangler high school building. No successor was named.

In other action, the committee elected one instructor and one substitute, accepted the resignation of a third teacher and completed the football coaching staff.

Mrs. Gilda Byrnes of Barnesboro was elected a commercial instructor. She taught last year in Hastings-Elder Joint School District. Mrs. Joseph G. Spangler, was elected a substitute in the commercial department.

The committee accepted the resignation of Mrs. Louise Westrick, Barnesboro, member of the commercial staff. She has accepted a position in Westmont-Upper Yoder School District.

Directors announced applications are being accepted for one commercial teacher vacancy.

Charles T. Keenan of Carrolltown, was retained as assistant varsity coach under head coach Dan Miller. Victor Chervenak of Barnesboro was moved up from B team coach to the backfield varsity coach.

Elected to fill the B team va-

cancy was Joseph Frontino of Spangler. The committee elected Daniel Vodzak of Barnesboro as junior high school coach.

It was also announced that the first two home games of the '55-'56 season will be played at the Spangler Stadium.

McKenzie Motor Company of Barnesboro received a contract to supply a driver-training car for the district.

Bids on shop equipment were referred to the supervising principal and his secretary for tabulation. A report will be made at the next meeting. The band committee will study bids received for music equipment.

The supervising principal was authorized to begin repairs to the Churella Building, which houses the home economics and shop departments and several classrooms of the Spangler Unit.

Pennsylvania State University extension mining courses will be offered again this year if sufficient interest is shown, directors said. A survey of prospective students will be conducted soon.

The state milk program will be continued this term. Next meeting will be held next Thursday, Sept. 8.

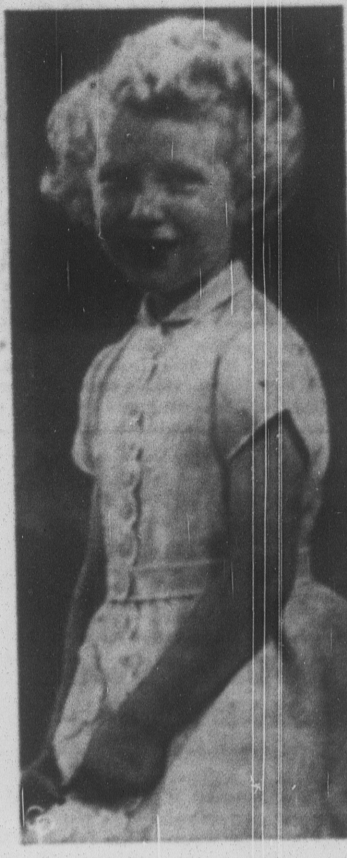

### Sept. 9 to Be Final Date for Voting For Conservation Committeemen

#### Ballots Being Mailed To District Farmers

The Cambria ASC Committee currently is mailing out ballots to farmers to use in selecting the Community Committeemen who will represent them in the Agriculture Conservation Program for 1956.

On the ballots will be the names of those persons nominated by the Community Election Board. Farmers will vote for five persons.

The nominee receiving the highest number of votes in each community will be the chairman and the delegate to the County Con-vention from that community. The nominees receiving the next highest vote will be vice-chairmen and alternate delegates. The next high vote getters will be the third regular member of their community, and the fourth and fifth highest vote getters will be the first and second alternate committeemen.

Ballots are to be taken or mailed to the Cambria County ASC offices located in the Law Building, 215 S. Center St., Ebensburg. The final date for receiving ballots is Sept. 9 and any mailed must be postmarked not later than midnight of Sept. 9.

A tabulation board composed of Frank A. Noel, John Strittmatter and Charles Sheehan will meet on Sept. 12 to count the ballots. The persons elected as delegates to the County Convention will meet the last week in September to elect the County Committee to serve for 1956.

The County Election Board is composed of H. C. Terndrup, the county farm agent, Hilbert Noel of FHA and Samuel Ricketts of BCS.

In each of the 11 communities in Cambria County the County Election Board selected three men to serve as a Community Election Board who will serve as a nominating committee and shall select names of those persons whose names will appear on the ballot for their community.

Farmers also can vote for persons whose names are not on the ballots by writing in the names in the space provided on the ballots of those persons who do not appear. The following persons are serving as Community Election Boards in seven communities in this Northern Cambria area:
