Brough, Campbell At Farm Electrical Seminar of Penelec

William Brough, Jr., vocational agriculture teacher at Patton-Chest High, and D. D. Campbell, "vo ag" instructor at Ebersburg-Cambria High, were among representatives of 18 schools in the Central Pennsylvania area who attended a recent Penelec seminar at Penn Alto Hotel in Altoona on the new approaches to teaching farm electrification and costs of operating equipment.

Bus Route Hearing To Be Continued

A hearing on the application of a Cherry Tree man to operate a bus route from Cherry Tree to Johnstown has been continued until a date to be announced later.

The hearing before an examiner of the Public Utility Commission on the application of Martin J. Baker for bus service for employees of Johnstown Plant, Bethlehem Steel Company, and the public was scheduled for Tuesday in the Indiana Courthouse.

Action to continue the hearing was taken after witnesses failed to appear for Paddock Bus Line of Hastings. The Paddock Line, it was revealed, is protesting Baker's proposed passenger-pickup stop in Spangler.

New Phone System At Loretto College

An improved 24-hour telephone service now is in operation at St. Francis College, Loretto. A switchboard and complete intercommunication system for the college campus have been installed. Eight trunk lines have replaced the two lines previously in use.

The changeover was made to remedy overloading of the old system, caused by the growth of the college. The new system has condense equipment which will enable up to five persons to take part in a single call.

New Strip Mining Bill Would Require Complete Filling In

A new House bill would require bituminous coal strip mine operators to backfill pits so that the overburden removed during mining will be replaced completely and leveled.

Under the present bituminous open pit mining conservation act, the backfilling provision requires only that the exposed face of unmined coal be covered.

The bill introduced by C. O. Williams (D-Washington) and Frank M. O'Neil (D-Clearfield) would give the operator one year after he stops mining to finish restoration measures.

In addition, the bill would double both the \$300 per acre and minimum \$3,000 bonding requirements to insure completion of backfilling and replanting.

Another provision would require operators to furnish the mine inspector a scale map of the operation and would increase from 15 to 75 feet the backfilling necessary along the right of way of a public highway.

New Voter Drive Set By Both Parties

Both major political parties in Cambria County are getting ready for a drive for new voter registrations next month.

County commissioners have set Sept. 16 and 17 for field registration. About 25 centers in different communities will be open on each of the two days to accept new registrations and changes of address.

The Democrats currently are holding a series of district "pop" meetings to line up their workers for the registration drive.

Republican district chairman and candidates held a number of similar meetings last week. The GOP County Committee will meet Monday, Sept. 12, in Courtroom 1 of the Ebersburg Courthouse to make final plans for registration and to discuss the November election campaign.
