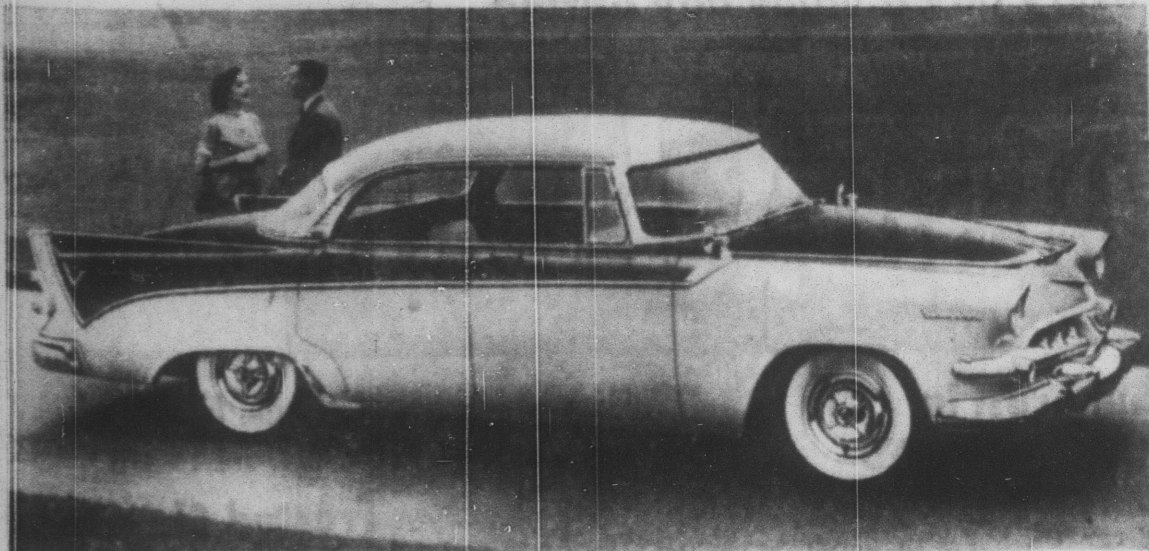


### Dodge Introduces New 4-Door Hardtop

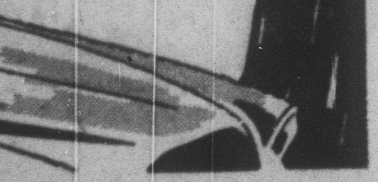

### Democrats In County Have 3-2 Edge Over Republicans

Have Shown Steady Gain In Registration Lead Since 1948; GOP Had Similar Lead In 1933

Cambria County Democrats will go into the Nov. 8 Municipal Election with almost a 3-to-2 edge in voter registration.

Final figure for next month's election show the Democratic Party with 57,978 registered voters in contrast to 41,145 for the Republicans.

That is a two-way record for the Democrats in Cambria County.

There are more persons affiliated with the Democratic party than ever before.

The registration edge 16,833 of the Democrats over their rivals is the greatest in the party's history.

Registration Record

As a matter of fact, the Democratic registration of almost 58,000 is a new high for either of the two major political parties. It exceeds by about 9,500 the Republicans' peak registration of 48,499 in 1931.

The two-way record hung up by the Democrats is a climax to a 25-year fight for registration supremacy.

In 1931 the Republicans were riding high with an all-time registration majority of 28,000 over the Democrats.

GOP Overtaken in 1937

This majority was whittled down year by year until the Democrats overtook the Republicans for the first time during two years, 1937 and 38, of Democratic Governor George Earle's administration.

Republicans regained the driver's seat in 1939 by thin margin

and held it through 1942. Starting in 1943, the Democratic party went into the lead in registration in the county and has since retained it.

The Democratic achievement in capturing the Pennsylvania state-house last November led to the party's biggest registration gain in recent years.

Since the election of November, 1954, the Democrats have gained 2,378 voters and the Republicans have lost 5,600. In November of last year the Democratic registration edge was 9,425.

Nearly 100,000 Can Vote

Besides the 57,978 Democrats and 41,145 Republicans registered for next month's election, there are 240 persons registered with minor parties or as non-partisans. All told, 99,363 are registered.

The all-time total registration record was set for the 1957 Presidential election, when 104,927 persons were eligible to vote.

**Ex-Cambria Official Dies At Home In Elyria, Ohio**

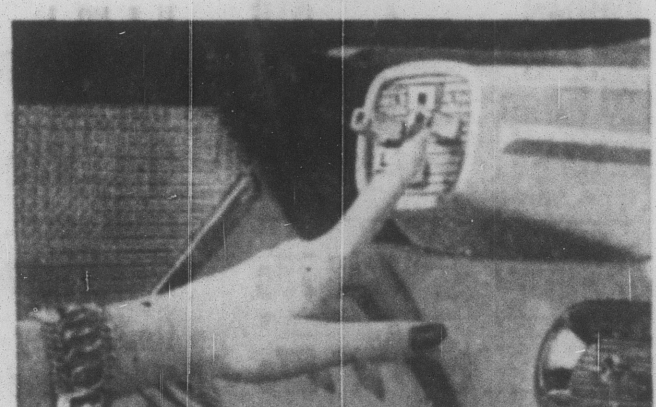
