Scouts to Hike Route of Armstrong Band Across North Cambria County

Local Historical Society Taking Active Part In Planning for Anniversary of March Made In 1756

Tentative arrangements to observe the 200th Anniversary of the famous Armstrong March over the Kittanning Path in 1756 were made last Wednesday night by members of a five-county committee at a meeting at a restaurant on Short Mountain, near Canoe Creek.

Issuing invitations to historical societies to plan local celebrations, the group mapped out a route for the Boy Scouts who will make the journey in relays beginning Aug. 30, 1956, at Shirk's cottage and ending Sept. 8 at Kittanning.

One of the stops along the route will be at Gaysport, Hollidaysburg, Sept. 2, for church services, exactly the same procedure followed by Lt. Col. John Armstrong and his band of 307 frontiersmen.

Ending with a four-day affair at Kittanning, the trek will commemorate the first successful march of English forces into the French and Indian territory only one year after Braddock's disastrous defeat south of Pittsburgh.

Co. School Lunch Workshop Draws Over 90 Persons

A workshop in evaluating school hot lunch programs was held at a meeting of the Cambria Co. School Lunch Institute Saturday in St. Columba's School, Cambria City.

Approximately 90 persons, representing 35 schools, attended the session. During the workshop, representatives were asked to evaluate hot lunch programs in their respective schools on special forms prepared by the University of Minnesota. The workshop was directed by Edward F. McGuire, assistant superintendent of county schools.

Mr. McGuire announced that federal surplus food now available to hot lunch programs includes lard, peanut butter, dried apricots, cottonseed oil and red beans. The food is made available through the department of agriculture.

Miss Louise Kaylor of Ebensburg, nutritionist with the Department of Health, reported on a school lunch conference of the American Dietetic Association in St. Louis, Mo.

Next meeting will be held on Saturday, Feb. 11, in Colver.
