Reform ball is still rolling.

There is whisperings around Washington to the effect that the Republicans will pass no tariff reduction bill this session, because at the end of the session the treasury surplus, it is expected, will have been turned into a deficiency. The rumor may possibly be true about no bill being passed, but if so it is partly because the Republican protectionists have not been able to throttle the demand for Tariff Reform among their Republican colleagues. The cry for free raw material is becoming a loud one, particularly from the Eastern manufacturers. Recently Senator Hale, who has been as pronounced a protectionist as Blaine, presented a long petition from New England manufacturers, asking that raw materials need by them be admitted free of duty.

THERE has been recently, and is now, marked activity in the ranks of the Democratic Society, of Pennsylvania, of which useful organization nearly every Democratic Club in the State is a member. Vigorous steps are being taken to disseminate true Democratic principles. The organization itself is a part of the National Association of Democratic Clubs.

The greatest abuse connected with the present system of road repair—which has been very freely commented upon in the columns of the Herald—is that resulting from the provision of the old law allowing the working out of road taxes on the part of those to whom they are assessed.

This provision is a relie of what may be considered remote antiquity—not merely "before the war," to use an elastic expression long in fashion, but even anterior to the adoption of present form of government, when money present form of government, when money assured and a system of Darter was in vogue in all rural neighborhoods instead of the mor advanced methods of buying and selling long prevalent.

all rural neighborhoods instead of the more advanced methods of buying and selling long prevalent.

On this crude idea was based the legislation which remands the whole work of road repair to those who are unskilled in such work and whose only aim is often to put in fime regardless of the effect upon the highways.

Some one proposes that this system, instead of being swept away at one stroke, shall be indefinitely perpetuated by the issuing of bonds in exchange for labor and material to be used in the work of macadamizing towpship roads. It is possible that some system of supervision could be devised which would guarantee that such an exchange would be fair and just to the public, but it must be a different experience from that of the past to realize that result. Inferior material and labor inadequate to the purpose would almost certainly be given as an equivalent for the bonds, and the old evils of working out road tax would be repeated.—Norristown Herald.
