

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Weekly Coal Report. The anthracite coal trade closed the year 1890 in excellent condition and with the outlook for the year 1891 promising. Harmony among the producing and car-rying interests was much better main-tained than had been expected, and, while the prices obtained for anthracite during the year were not up to the ave-rage of the previous two years, yet they were not entirely unsatisfactory or unre-munerative to the producers. The total output of coal for the year 1890 reached thirty-five and three-quarter milliontons, an increase of about three hundred thou-sand tons over that of 1889.
