**WASHINGTON LETTER.**

Washington, D. C., April 7.

The newspaper romancers of the national capital have become tired of straining their inventive powers in describing the result of the "battle-royal" between Mr. Cleveland and the Democratic senators, a battle which has not begun and is not likely to begin, this week started on another tack with the first chapter of a new and exciting romance entitled "disensions in the cabinet," which will be run as a serial in Republican and sensational newspapers as long as the invention of the authors hold out, or until something new and more startling shall have been evolved from their thinking tanks. This first chapter opens with a spirited description of the intention of Secretaries Carlisle and Gresham to resign, which is written with all the skill that has characterized the numerous "intentions of Mr. Cleveland," written by the same authors, and it is every bit as true.

Neither Secretary Carlisle nor Secretary Gresham are dissatisfied, or have any intention of retiring from the cabinet. On the contrary they are, in common with their colleagues in the cabinet, in perfect harmony with President Cleveland in his determination to give the country the best and most successful administration it has had since the war, and, what is more important, indications of success are becoming more plentiful every day. If the secretaries named, or any of their colleagues, were contemplating resigning, you may be sure that the Republican romancers would be the last men in Washington who would be taken into their confidence. Ananias was a mere novice in the art of prevarication when compared with the correspondents of Republican newspapers who try to earn their salaries by writing what their managing editors order, instead of the facts about Washington news.

Unless the senate adopts a resolution calling for the facts, it is not probable that the people will ever know just how extravagant ex-Secretary of State Foster has been in taking his personal favorites to Paris as attaches of himself, ostensibly as necessary for a proper presentation of our case before the Behring sea arbitration tribunal. Much of the money expended by Foster will never be accounted for, as it was taken from the secret fund, always at the disposal of the secretary of state. Although ex-Private Secretary Halford is one of the principal beneficiaries of Foster's lavishness, no one believes that Mr. Harrison either knew or sanctioned anything that was not perfectly right and proper.

"The holders of sinecures in the government service are all in a state of mind, as they know that quiet and careful investigations are in progress in every one of the departments, and that as fast as they are reached they will have to go."

The Washington Single Tax Club this week gave a reception and dinner in honor of Judge James Maguire, of California, the new single tax congressman. The unique menu card read as follows: "Some of the Products of Land Prepared by Labor." "Air and Water Free." Among the toasts responded to were "The Single Tax in Politics," by Representative Maguire; "The Work of the Future," by Thomas G. Shearnam; "Washington as It Might Be," by Representative Tom L. Johnson, of Ohio; "The Work of the Next Congress," by Representative John DeWitt Warner; "Farmers and the Single Tax," by Representative Jerry Simpson, and "Wages," by Judge Henry A. Robinson, of Detroit, the new statistician of the department of agriculture.

A considerable number of important appointments have been made this week, and so far as can be learned they gave general satisfaction to Democrats, particularly those in the diplomatic and consular service.

President Cleveland still retains his fondness for living in the country, and has leased a residence near the one he purchased during his first term, and he expects to have his family settled there by the first of May.

Secretary Morton requested Assistant Attorney General Colby, a Republican hold-over, to assist Chief Clerk MacCraig, of the agricultural department, investigating the charges which have been made against officials of the weather bureau, in order that no one could say it was to be a partisan affair. He also ordered that the investigation should be public and officially invited all reputable persons who know anything for or against the accused officials to come forward and testify. Secretary Morton's plain and straight-forward way of doing business is rapidly earning him popularity.
