The amount of money in treasury after last audit was \$1169.13; from per capitia tax, initiations and proceeds of excursion, \$376.84; making a total of \$1545.97; disbursements, \$474.50. Leaving a balance in treasury of \$1071.47.

The report was referred to the auditing committee, as was also a bill of \$10 incurred by the secretary in sending out circulars for quarterly meetings.

The treasurer's report was read, and the auditing committee returned to examine the two reports.
