PICKED UP BY THE WAY.

THINGS SEEN AND HEARD IN THE TOWN AND VICINITY.

Matters of a Local Nature Commented Upon and Placed Before the Readers of the "Tribune" in Large Letters—Some Paragraphs May Interest You.

Without any desire to create a cholera scare or to pose as a sensationalist, I feel that it is necessary to call the attention of the proper authorities—the borough councilmen—to the condition of affairs existing at the sewer outlet near the Lehigh Valley tracks toward Highland. The odor arising from the outlet is anything but pleasant to passers-by—in fact it is about the worst grade of perfumery I have ever met. Travelers, of course, are not supposed to walk along the railroad and are not compelled to inhale this odor, but there are a number of families residing on Adams Street who do have to endure the stench, and when the winds blow toward their homes it is almost unbearable. A visit to the locality at any hour of a warm day will convince my readers that this outlet is situated entirely too near the town. It should be extended at the very least 200 yards the other side of the railroad tracks. The Points, being without sewers, have enough to endure without breathing this polluted air. An investigation of this is needed immediately.

Republicans are very quiet here so far as county politics go. Perhaps it is because they show more sense than their opponents by not getting excited during the warm weather, or perhaps it is on account of the hopeless campaign they will have to go through this fall. However, they are maintaining a silence that is remarkable, and about the only name mentioned is that of Tommy Smith, of Milnesville, who will be a candidate for re-election as commissioner. From what I can learn from Republicans Mr. Smith's nomination is a reasonable certainty and his chances of election will not be so forlorn as some of his associates on the ticket. He has a large following in the Democratic ranks, and I know positively that he will receive a vote of no small proportions from men in that party, let the Democrats nominate whom they wish. But outside of the quiet work being done by Commissioner Smith's friends no interest seems to be taken in politics by the Republicans.

Democratic candidates for delegate to the county convention are getting their forces in line for the election on Saturday afternoon. In some of the districts the fight is waxing hot and the would-be county ticket makers are working like Trojans for every vote they can secure. It is strange, indeed, how men will throw themselves into these delegate contests and endeavor to secure the election of themselves or some friends to positions that are said to give the winner nothing but the empty honor of representing his district at Wilkes-Barre. Glory must be a great thing when people will lose time, borrow trouble and exert themselves in so many ways to attain it.

From a letter published in the Progress of Friday last I see that School Director Rute informs me that any advice upon the subject of teachers' appointments was unnecessary and uncalled for. Whether I am to consider that the writer of the letter is the official spokesman for the board or whether he is only writing to defend his own illegal and unlawful action as a member is not plain from the tone of his communication. But that the board has not delegated Mr. Rute to defend its work I am reliably informed, and that the sentiments he expressed are not concurred in by a majority of the members is also another point he might have considered before investing himself with the authority to write or cause to be written documents of a semi-official flavor.

By what means he knows that "we" (the directors I presume) will do this and that "our" (the directors again very likely) reasons are not necessary to publish, savors somewhat of the mysterious. Is this director gifted with the talent of foresight to predict what the board will or will not do at its

meetings to come—or is it a hint to the public that everything is already cut and dried for whatever objections "may bob up?" Does he think that the board is a machine to be run to suit the whims and fancies of a portion of its members, or does he have to be reminded that it is a public body, bound to obey the laws, and that its actions are at all times open to the criticisms of its master—the public? It seems he is not aware of these things, and I will accept his confession in the opening of his communication where he states that he "perhaps knows very little."

Again, he says: "For information to the author we follow the said (school) laws as closely as other boards." Exceedingly grateful I would be for information that would enlighten me on the subject, but I find that the above quotation contains just a little too much misinformation to be of any benefit to me. What other boards follow the laws like the Freeland borough board? Foster, Hazle and Hazleton city directors voted openly on teachers' appointments. But is that the way they did in Freeland? No, it was done in the dark, secretly and consequently unlawfully, and this little paragraph, section LIII, page 32, of the Pennsylvania school laws, will bear out my assertion:

That no tax for school or building purposes shall be levied, no resolution shall be adopted for the purchase or sale of any school real estate, no school house shall be located, or its location abandoned or changed, no teacher shall be appointed or dismissed, no annual school term shall be determined on, nor shall any general course of studies be adopted or annual series of text-books be selected, in any common school district, except by the affirmative votes of a majority of the whole number of the directors or controllers thereof; and in each of said cases, the names of the members voting both in the affirmative and negative, shall be so entered on the minutes of the board by the secretary.

Yet the writer of the Progress article has the audacity to declare I am too previous when I question the secret ballot, to say that he sought proper and legal advice and knows no reason why their action of the 5th ult. should not be supported, and to state that it is not necessary to publish reasons for their law-defying work. Men of this calibre, who do wrong and then deliberately acknowledge that wrong and refuse to make any attempt to right it, are entirely too large to sit as directors of the Freeland school board. They are above the laws of the state, and are qualified for nothing below receivers or directors of the Reading or some other law-breaking corporation. The people want directors who have some respect for the oaths of office they have taken—not men whose only desire appears to be to show how independently they can act and to sneer at the law when it is shown them.
