State Board of Health Meets

The following letter was received this norning by the Freeland board of health The twenty-seventh regular meeting of the Pennsylvania state board of health was held at Lancaster of Friday. Refrom the secretary of the state board of ports were received of the manage Philadelphia, Pa., May 12, 1894. Dear Sirs:—The steamship Poland, thich arrived at the port of New York of small pox, which recently existed in twenty-six points in the state. It was shown that the disease reached these points from Danville, where it was imcases of small pox. One of her immi-grants was destined for your town.
