COUNCIL AGREES TO ILLUMINATE THE LOWER END OF TOWN.

A New Board of Health, consisting of Five Members, appointed on Friday Evening—Borough Officials Report for the Month of July.

The members of the borough council held their regular monthly meeting on Friday evening. All members were present. The minutes of the last regular and four special meetings were read and approved, with the exception of the meeting held on July 12, at which taxes were levied. It was decided to meet next Friday evening and revise the tax levy.

The street commissioner's report showed the work done on the streets in July amounted to \$51.92. He also reported having placed index street-boards where the same were needed. He was instructed to place them on the corners of all streets in the new additions to the borough.

The president presented the following as the board of health, and they were approved: Dr. H. M. Neale, five years; Dr. F. Schlicher, four years; D. J. McCarthy, three years; Chas. Duschek, two years; and Hugh Malloy, one year.

The invitation from the G. A. R. to participate in the dedication ceremonies on the 23d inst. was read and accepted. Adjourned to meet in special session on next Friday evening.

PROPERTY DAMAGED AT SCRANTON.

Great excitement was caused on Thursday at Scranton when the earth for three blocks on the west side of the city emitted a sound like the report of a cannon, and then settled to a depth varying from one inch to four feet, affecting property valued at over a quarter of a million dollars.

Two Polanders were caught in the mine by the cave-in and imprisoned by walls of rock. The work of rescue was begun, and a large pipe was driven into the colliery to furnish air to the imprisoned men.
