For some time past the trice of coal in the cities has been lower han it has been for years, and, notwith-tanding the conditions were anything out favorable, the Reading Company one time ago made a reduction in the price, which caused the other companies of follow suit, and since then the price as been practically whatever the eost would bring. The
