Either the goods do not some up to the standard of the adver-isement or they have not been advertis-de enough. That is to say though you may have paid for advertising you have not got it. Perhaps because you have elected a medium that does not reach the people you want to reach. In that case you have not advertised at all, or your advertisement has reached only a ew people.




