The Democratic ticket in the borough pulled through all right, notwithstanding the heavy vote polled. The majority has been reduced from 79 last fall, as shown in the table printed below, to figures varying from 12 for Schwartz to 39 for Shovlin. The workers of both parties were out in force and succeeded in bringing all the voters to the polls, with a few exceptions. The Republicans gained by this increased vote, but not enough to overcome the Democratic majority of the South ward.

Geoppert, for council in the North ward, ran away head of his ticket in his district, the fourth, but Zemany's majority in the first was too great to allow him to win. The other ward candidates polled about the party vote.

In the South ward everything went against the Republicans. The Democratic candidates for council, school director, constable and election offices won with ease.

Schwartz ran well all through the

borough, considering the work that was being doue here for his opponent.

Inspector Roderick's Report.

Mine Inspector James E. Roderick, of this district, which comprises all, the collieries in the Lehigh region, has prepared his report for 1895. The total production of coal, including that sold for home consumption, and that used in generating steam in and about the mines, was 6,590,998 tons, an increase over the production of 1894 of 458,371 tons.

The total number of accidents for the year were 53 fatal and 96 non-fatal. There are 18,465 employes in the district, an increase of 104 over 1894. There is a decrease in the number of kegs of powder used in 1895. In 1894 there were 112,890 kegs used, against 198,307 for the past year.
