LIQUOR DEALERS ORGANIZE. Freeland Branch Starts Out With a Large Number of Members. At a meeting of the retail liquor dealers of Freeland on Friday at the Central hotel a branch of the Retail Liquor Dealers' Association of Pounsyl-vania was formed. P. H. Nolan, of Philadelphia, an organizer of the as-sociation, was present and delivered an effective address upon the necessity of liquor dealers organizing and protecting themselves against those who are trying to ruin their business. The local branch elected the following officials: President-Stephen Drasher. First vice president-John Rugan. Recording sceretary-John Shigo. Financial sceretary-Frank Eberett. Treasurer-S. DePierro. Sergeant-at-arms-Richard Welsh. Momber of state committee-I. A. Fry. Nearly all the saloon men of town was taken in the matter. The State Association was formed Immense Bed of Granite. 
