Each rifle must be accompanied by a written agreement to manufacture such arms in the United States, not exceeding 10,000, as may be required by the state, at a cost not to exceed \$20. Washington, April 21.—Mr. Willis, rep., Del., has offered in the house a joint resolution authorizing and direct-ing the president to invite commercial nations of the world to join in an inter-national monetary conference to be held at as early a date as possible, for the purpose of establishing an inter-national standard of ratio between gold and silver as money. A commis-sion of nine is created—three to be members of the house, appointed by the speaker; three to be senators, and three to be appointed by the president. 
