Work upon the foundation of the silk
mill building is progressing rapidly under the supervision of Mr. Simpson.
Quite a number of men are employed,
and every possible effort is being made
to finish the job without further delay.
The projectors leave no room to doubt
their intentions, as they have completed
the purchase of the land for the site of
the mill and the deed has been executed.

The Board of Trade met last evening in the council room. President H. B. Price called the meeting to order, and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.
