Harrisburg, Pa., April 9, 1897. The senate not having been in session and the house convening Monday even-ng and adjourning on Wednesday afternoon until Monday, not much time was devoted to law making this week. But that seems to be characteristic of this legislature, not the amount of work done but the amount not done. In saying this I do not mean to be quoted as including all the members and senators. There are some, but not a working majority, who are just as diligent in the performance of their legislative duties as they are in their own private business. They have told me that they were opposed to this wantom water of public time, but the majority rules and they are forced to obey the will of the majority, although to whatever detriment they may appear to their constituents. I could name these men and they come from a good many of the counties in which my letters are read.
