The convention was a spirited one and the rivairy of the candidates made it interesting until the end. The contests were waged vigorously, but with a good nature that has left no sores to heal nor factions to pacify. The delegates organized for business by electing William R. Gibbons, of Wilkesbarre as chairman, and the required number of secretaries, tellers and vice presidents.
