SHERIFF MARTIN AND DEPUTIES ARE BEFORE THE BAR. Several of the Accused Have Been Dis-charged on Motion of the District Attorney, There Being no Evidence Against Them-The Jury Selected. charged on Motion of the District Atorney, There Being no Evidence Against Them-The Jury Solected. The trial of Sheriff James Martin and seventy-eight men who were sworn in as deputies, charged with shooting and killing eighteen men and wounding thirty-five others at Lattimer on Sop-tember 10, 1897, began on Tuesday in the courts of this county. The brutai erime which these men have to answer. by the nature of the circumstances sur-rounding it, has obtained not only a national reputation, but has gone across the seas and found a place on the achives of foreign countries. Newspaper read-ers the world over know the details of the Lattimer massacre, hence their re-potition is unnecessary now. The case promises to be one of the most interesting ever tried in Luzerne courts. District Attorney T. R. Martin is conducting the prosecution, assisted by James Scarlet, of Danville, one of the leading criminal attorneys of the state; state Chairman John M. Garman, of Nanticoke; E. F. McGovern, of Wilkes-barre, and P. F. Laughran, of Haeleton. John T. Lenaban, one of the most emi-ment criminal attorneys in the state; is assisted by ex-Attorney General H. W. Palmer, George B. Forris, F. W. Whea-ton and George H. Troutman. There wich will be settled at this trial, chief among them the question to what exten ctilizens can use the public high-way with demonstrative attempt without being considered riotous. There will too, in somo measure be settled the question of whether the Austrian, Italian and German govern-ments have ground for a claim for dam-ages, citizens of those contriles being among the killed and wounded.
