It will now comprise Assistant Secretary Theodore Roosevelt, president; Rear Admiral Montgomery Sicard, naval adviser to Secretary Long; Captain A. S. Goodrich, have been retired from duty as members of the Board. Admiral Walker will probably be retamed on duty at the Department in an advisory capacity. SUPPLIES FOR GOMEZ. To Be Delivered to Him in Person By Uncle Sam. Washington, D. C. — Arrangements have been completed by the Government to sup-ply the Cuban insurgents with arms and ammunition. Preparations are now being made to land in Cuba from 26,000 to 30,-000 stand of improved Springfield rifles, a number of artillery batteries, rapid-free Maxim guns and an abundance of ammu-nition for the effective use of them.
