UPPER LEHIGH NOTES.

The remains of Patrick Murrin were interred yesterday afternoon in St. Ann's cemetery. He died on Friday after an illness of over a year, during which time he suffered much pain. The deceased was aged 32 years and is survived by a wife and two young daughters, also by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Murrin, of Butler valley, and the following brothers: Michael, of Freeland; Charles and Edward, of Jeddo; John, of Idaho; and Joseph and Daniel, who reside with their parents.

DYNAMITE FIENDS AT WORK.
