German Admiral Has Unsatisfactory Interview With English Admiral Regarding Situation.

London, July 21.—Admiral Dewey i London, July 21.—Admiral Dewey in-formed a correspondent at Cavite on July 14 that the situation in reference to the behavior of the German warship frene in Manila bay had much im-proved, and that conditions were then the most satisfactory since the begin-ning of the annoyances. Hong Kong cable - advices to the London Daily Mall say that, accord-ing to a statement made by Mr. Wild-man, the American consul, as the Ger-

Hong Kong cable advices to the London Daily Mall say that, according to a statement made by Mr. Wildman, the American consul, as the German warship Irene was passing Mariveles a few days ago the United States dispatch boat Hugh McCulloch was sent by Admiral Dewey to ask her to stop.

The Irene refused to comply with the request, whereupon a shell was fired at her and a boat was sent to watch her. Admiral Diedrichs protested, it was said against this action, and insisted that the German ships were entitled to enter the harbor without being searched. But Admiral Dewey, according to the dispatch, declined to recognize such a right. It was further stated that Admiral Diedrichs asked Captain Chichester of the British warship Immortalite what he would do if the Germans interfered with an American hombardment of Manila, and that the captain replied that only he and Admiral Dewey knew what action would be taken by the English in such an event.

Dispatches from Manila, dated July 18, 31 and 14, via Hong Kong, July 18, show that the flour supply of the city is practically exhausted although there is still plenty of rice and buffalo meat Admiral Dewey is tightening the blockade, and because the Spāniards have surreptitiously used the mail privileges he threatens to curtail some of the freedom of the harbor. The Spanish say that if Dewey places his warships opposite the city and within warships opposite the city and within



that he has 50,000 insurgents eager to enter the city.

The insurgents had a land fight on July 10, south of Manila. They drove the Spaniards back to their last trench in front of Malate, which is an outpost south of Manila.

General Anderson, who is preparing to receive the other American brigades, has made a reconnoitre around Manila from south to north. He will send a battalion of California troops under Colonel Dubose to camp above Paranaque, so that they will get accustomed to shooting as well as gaining other experience in the field.

Marblehead's Launches Busy.

Guantanamo Bay, July 21.—A boat from the Marblehead went up the bay this afternoon to Verteaya del Toro, opposite Caimanera, and gave formal notice to the Spanish commander of the surrender of General Toral's troops together with the conditions of the capitulation of Santiago. A limited time was fixed for hauling down the Spanish flag over Caimanera.

The American officer also gave notice that if the Spanish gunboat Sandoval was disabled in any way, or if arms, ammunition, public buildings or barracks at Caimanera or Guantanamo were destroyed, the Spaniards would not be treated as prisoners of
