In Philadelphia last Thursday Chief Justice Sterrett delivered the opinion of the supreme court in the case of the Junitae Limestone Company, Limited, against Millard H. Fagley. This was an appeal by the defendents from the common pleas court of Blair county, which court held that the act of June 14, 1897, entitled "an act regulating the employment of foreign-born, unnaturalized persons" to be unconstitutional because it offends against the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States, and section 1, article 9, of our own constitution.

This act was known as the alien labor tax law, and Chief Justice Sterrett says it belongs to a vicious class of legislation, and affirms the decision of the lower court, quoting largely from the opinion of Judge Acheson, of the United States circuit court, who had also declared the act to be unconstitutional.

It is now in order for the corporations and firms of this vicinity to return the three-cent tax collected from their alien employes. Nothing but a decision of the supreme court, it was stated, would get this money back. Now that the decision has been given, common honesty demands a prompt return of the money.
