shipping Molten Iron.

A mechanical and an economical triumph reported from Pennsylvania is the daily shipment of tons of molten iron by railway from the blast furnaces at Duquesne to the Homestead Steel Works. This remarkable service was instituted on the 1st of June, and is now an ordinary daily routine. The molten iron as it is tapped from the furnaces runs into an immense mixing ladie having a capacity of 250 tons, and from this it is poured into the 20-ton ladie-cars, the ladies being made of sheet-steel or iron, with a lining of refractory material. The cars are then hauled by a locomotive to the steel works, where the direct conversion of the molten iron into open-hearth steel is made, avoiding all the expense of casting the metal into pigs and cooling, handling, reloading, reheating and remelting the pig metal. It is stated that between 700 and 800 tons of iron are transported daily from the Duquesne furnaces in this manner.
