He would not draw an order for over \$2,000 salary on the first day of his entrance to the office and charge it to alleged back pay due him while the courts were de-ciding upon the constitutionality of the act creating the office. He would not needlessly increase the tax rate of the county, nor would he become a silent partner in county contracts. George Shiffer owes no poor district money or-dered paid by the court for expenses in taking care of victims, because his sense of honor and regard for morality is above those sins which cannot be named in decent newspapers.
