comference recently with the house committee on appropriations and the situation was thoreughly gone over. The governor advocates the cutting down the yearly appropriation to the public schools about \$1,500,000\$. Governor Hastings also tried this during his term, but the country members opposed it to a man and the pian had to be abandoned.

As far as salaries of public school districts need all of this appropriation and more to it. It may seem scarcely credible, but it is nevertheless true that the average rate of wages of teachers in this state is only \$315.71 per year. The lowest salaries paid are in a township in Crawford county where a teacher receives only \$82,83½ for a year's teaching. There are plenty of others who receive a hundred dollars for a term of six months.

THE GOVERNOR IS DETERMINED that unless additional revenue is provided he will not approve any appropriations to hospitals or educational in stitutions, and that no more money will be appropriated or laws approved which

receive a hundred dollars for a term of six months.

This debt of \$3,500,000 must be paid during his administration. He does not expect this money to be paid by the present session, but he insists that it must be liquidated before his term expires.

The members of the committee practically agreed that no new applicants for state aid would be considered; that their bills would not even be reported; that the public schools were receiving too much of \$11,000,000 every two years. It was pointed out that the schools receive one-half of the entire revenue of the state, the other half being distributed, in round numbers, as follows: State government, \$6,000,000. National Guard, \$1,000,000; his ane and penal institutions, sl.5,000,000. Spitals and charitable institutions, nearly \$2,000,000; sinking fund, \$6,600,000.

Prices of anthracite coal are unchanged, although the operators claim there is a firmness to the market, which, however, they admit can only be maintained by a restriction of production, as the season for brisk demand based upon large consumption is past. Stocks both in New England and the West are considered small, but entirely sufficient for present needs. The production for present needs. The production for march will be restricted within 3,000,000 tons, which is about the usual output for the first month of spring.
