

Washington, D. C., August 1, 1899. Attorney General Griggs, before going off on his summer vacation, shattered the hopes of numerous persons who thought they had everything fixed to ecure valuable Porto Rican co secure valuable Porto Rican concessions from the war department, by rendering opinions upon three specific concessions: The right to use the water power of the river Plata, the right to build and operate a tranway, and the right to build and control, for all time, piers and wharves at Dance. I do not know of any right or power which the secretary of war or the president has to alienate in perpetuity, any of the public




