A Syrian Village Funeral.

The women surround the corpse, and do most of the mourning and wailing, and the men spend the time discussing subjects pertaining to life and death. As soon as a person dies the news is com-

Women hurry first to the bereaved home, and men come in large companies a little later. When the relatives see a number of men coming they stand in line to receive them. It is not good manners to say "good morning" to the bereaved before expressing one's sympathy to them. So when people come they stand in line facing the relatives of the dead, and all together say: "Our mind is with you in this bereavement; may you be kept safe; may the dead be a sacrifice for the prolongation of your lives; it is extremely grievous to us, but it is the will of God." This is the shortest form of expressing sympathy at a funeral, said with the right hands flying from their breasts to their heads and back in quick succession, and answered in the same manner by the relatives of the dead. After this they say "Good morning" all together and exchange "How are you?" etc. Undertakers are not found in Syria excepting in the large cities. 


Thinning Pears

Doubtless many pear blossoms usually fail to set fruit when the blossoming occurs during a cold, wet spell of weather. If it were not for this fact, the pear tree would always be overlooked, as it blossoms in clusters. Nature does a good deal of thinning, but she does not do it evenly, allowing sometimes three or four pears to set in one cluster, while dropping all off on another. This year it is likely that pear blossoming will occur in many places in dry, sunshiny weather. Therefore the orchardist, when he finds that pears have set to abundantly, should go to work early to helpature out of her difficulty. He may cut off many that would have dropped off themselves if let alone, but hand thinning will secure a more even stand and it will pay to do it early.

Cutting Strawberry Runners.

A great deal of work is usually required in keeping the runners cut back on the strawberry bed in summer. New shoots are constantly being sent out and a wholesale method of cutting them off is needed. Get the timman to cut you a ten-inch circle from the heaviest sheet iron or galvanized iron, and saw a slit in the end of a stout handle, and pin the wheel at the centre. This can be run quick-

Exterminating Thoras and Briers.

Next to eliminating the seeds and reducing the size of the stones and pits of fruits, the work of ridding our orchard trees and vines of thorns and briers is important. More has been accomplished in this direction than in the former; but our gardens are still encumbered with the thorns and briers on orange and lemon trees and prickers on raspberry, gooseberry and and blackberry vines. These briers and prickers on raspberry, gooseberry and and blackberry vines. These briers and prickers were originally intended to protect the fruits from wild animals, but they have outgrown their usefulness in the modern garden. Nature, however, may not think so, and she refuses to eliminate them. It becomes the duty of the horticulturist to diminish them by selecting buds from the branches with the fewest thorns or prickers. Besides making it inconvenient for the gardeners and pickers, the thorns puncture many fruits during windstorms, and ruin them for market purposes. Some varieties of orange and lemon trees are exceedingly thorny, and others, through cultivation, have been rendered almost thornless. Varieties of gooseberries are produced by the gardener's skill which are practically thornless. Among the apple and pear trees the thorns appears only today in the wild and crab apple varieties, although originally all of our trees in the garden came from thorny ancestors.




