ANOTHER FREELAND BOY'S EXPERI-ENCE IN THE FAR EAST

John Conaghau, of Town, Tells How He Finds Life in the Philippines—His Trip From San Francisco to Manila—City of Honolulu Described.

The following extracts from a letter written to his home here by John Cona-ghan, a private in Battery H, Sixth U. Headquarters U. S. Government. Manila, P. I., June 15, 1899.

I take great pleasure in writing to le ou know that I arrived safely in Manil you know that I arrived safely in Manila on May 21, and it was a relief to step on land again. We arrived in the bay on May 19, but were anchored there two days before we were sent ashore. We were stationed at first at a place called Luneta, a part of Manila, and began to serve Uncle Sam in the Philip-plnes by eating hard tack and corned board. All the present teachers in the town hip, who are normal school graduate and have taught for two years, were de clared elected for three years. An attempt was made to restrict the elecion to those teachers who are resident ines by eating hard tack and corne

pines by eating hard tack and corned beef and sleeping on the ground. I was very much surprised and pleased to meet John (Forty) O'Donnell here. He belongs to the Twenty-first infantry, which was then stationed at the Bridge of Spain on the way to New Manila, about five miles from us. 
