The Democratic county convention was held on Tuesday at Wilkesbarre. Judge G. L. Halsey, of White Haven, the Republican nominee for judge, was

The convention will be long remem The convention will be long remembered as the hottest thing Wilkesbarre has ever had within its borders. All past records for wrangling, disorder, confusion and wire-pulling were broken by the gathering which assembled there on Tuesday.

It was long past the hour named for opening when the delegates assembled. For hours before the forces, which on For hours before the forces, which on Tuesday were known as the Halseyites and the Freasites, had locked horns around the Square. Attorney Lenahan and his friends favored the endorsement of Halsey, while many others, especial-ly the friends of ex-State Chairman Garman, were willing to give the nomi-nation for judge to Attorney Freas, who was the only Democratic aspirant for the nomination. for the nomination

for the nomination.

The sentiment of the delegates was clearly in favor of Halsey's endorsement, but the published declaration by a Republican attorney on Monday, that he would be a candidate for the Republican nomination next year, caused many who favored endorsement to stand for the naming of a complet ticket by the he naming of a complete ticket by the Democrats

Democrats.

According as this feeling began spreading, the ire of the Halsey Democrats rose higher and higher, because the nomination of a Democrat this year meant Republican opposition to the party's candidate in 1900, and at this stage of the proceedings the delegates who went there for the "stuff" began to make their importance known.
