Orders have been issued by Markle & Co. that no more work shall be done on Sundays about their collieries, unless the same is absolutely necessary. Many of the employees have been complaining for months on account of being compelled to work every Sunday.

The county commissioners' statement of 1899 taxes due from collectors shows the following amounts: Daniel Kline, Freehand, \$872.96; W. E. Oberrender, Foster, \$437.78; W. H. Reinhard, Jeddoo, \$15.82; Patrick Smith, Hazle, \$957.58; Edwin Minnick, Butler, \$401.09.

The directors of the Central Poor District of Luzerne county, which includes Wilkes-Barre and neighboring towns and townships, have been voting themselves an annual salary of \$500 each for some years past, and the taxpayers of the district are up in arms against this willful extravagance.

William Kraft, aged 18 years, was smothered to death at VanWickle & Co.'s breaker at Coleraine yesterday. He was engaged in shoveling slate in a "pocket" when the slate was withdrawn. Before he could escape he was drawn through the bottom of the "pocket" and was dead when rescued.

As the result of a quarrel early Sunday morning, Michael Wilps is lying in the Pittston hospital, suffering from fourteen stab wounds, and is expected to die. The wounds, he says, were inflicted by Michael Dabulis and Martin Krikonis, and both these men were arrested and are now in jail.

James Carpenter, who for over forty years was a resident of Eckley, died at the Laurytown almshouse on Monday, aged 87 years. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon. Services were held at St. James' Episcopal church in Eckley by Rev. Marshall. The interment was made in Eckley cemetery.

Thomas Davis, who has been falsely accused of being a swindler, traveling under an assumed name, has been operating in nearby counties. He visits farms and asks for a glass of water. He then asks if any are sick, telling them that he is invested with healing power. He says a few incantations and then asks the privilege of going to a private room to pray. In every instance where he has been given this privilege he has carried away the most valuable articles in the room. Several farmers are now mourning the loss of gold spectacles, silverware, etc. He gives his name as Hartman.

Local opera-goers need have no fear but that the company which will appear here tonight in "Finnigan's Ball" is the genuine New York cast. They left the Metropolis theatre on Monday, and after appearing here will show at Mahanoy City and Hazleton and next Monday will open in Brooklyn. The "Ball" is highly endorsed by the newspapers of Reading, where it appeared Monday.

Jacob Zwelpigglesteinstopper is the name of a foreigner who has recently located in this city. The other morning a neighbor passing by him in a hurry said: "Good morning, I was glad to see you, but I will not mention your name; I'm short of breath this morning."

Mrs. John Leisenring, wife of Hon. John Leisenring, of Upper Lehigh, is lying very low at Hotel Lafayette, Philadelphia. Mrs. Leisenring has been ill for several weeks and is now in a critical condition.
