siday-Michael Klyucsal, a Prominent Slavonian, is bead-Deaths of Children. After a long and painful struggle for life against disease, Joseph NeuBurger passed quietly away at 6,15 o'cloic Saturday morning at his home on Front street. For the past few years the deceased had been in poor health, with occasional spells of improvement which were speedily followed by relapses. This continued until the early part of last week, when the physicians in attendance pronounced death near at hand. Weakened in body and spirit by his constant suffering, he lingered on until the hour mentioned, when death came and claimed him for its own.

Mr. NeuBurger was a native of Germany. He was born on November 13, 1843, and was therefore in his fifty-seventh year. He came to America in 1864 and worked in New York city nearly a year. From there he went to St. Louis and spent several years through the Weath of the structure of the work.

Mr. NeuBurger became an American
citizen in 1870, at 1 took pride in the
distinction of having been granted his
naturalization papers by Judge Bryan,
of Marion conaty, Illinois, father of
Hon. W. J. Bryan. He was married in
New York city to Mrs. Hannah Lewis,
who died here in November, 1885. The
following children survive him, Simon
J. Harry, Nettle, Minnie and Martin,
also the following step-children, Albert
Lewis, Wilkesbarre, Mrs. Hiram Ullman, Williamsport, and Miss Matilda
Lewis, Freeland.

The deceased was a prominent member of the Independent Order of Odd
Fellows, which order he joined at
Wilkesbarre nearly thirty years ago.
He was also a member of Lodge No. 200,
Brotherhood Protective Order of Elks,
of Hazleton.

Mr. NeuBurger was a man who took
an active interest in public affairs, both
local and general. He was a staunch
Republican and followed the party of
his choice on state and national questions, but was liberal in his views
and with his vote to matters pertaining
to affairs near at home. In February,
1894, he was chosen as a member of the
borough council and for three years
served with distinction on that body,
identifying himself on the side of
progress and the good of the town on
all occasions.

The funeral took place at 10 c'clock
this morning. At 11.45 o'clock the remains were taken to Wilkesbarre, where
they will be laid beside those of his wife
