The events which led to the acquisition of the Philippine archipelage are recounted, and the in-structions to and reports from American officers and commissioners in the islands are presented, showing what has been and is being done to bring the benefits of liberty and good government to these wards of the nation. Continuing, Mr. McKinley says: "The American people are asked by our opponents to yield the sovereignty of the United States in the Philippines to a small function of the population, a single tribe out of 80 or more inhabiting the archipelago, a fraction which wantonly attacked the American troops in Manila while in relativit possession under the protocol with Spain, awaiting the ratif-




