Appeals to Men Who Did Not Quit on Monday Are Having an Effect--Miners Are Gaining Ground.

The situation in the coal fields today so far as can be learned from unbiase sources, favors the strikers. Heavy morning throughout the Lehigh and Schuylkill regions by the pickets sta-tioned on the roads leading to the mines, and hundreds of workers who were un decided as to what they should do have

In the Wyoming and Lackawann regions the situation remains unchang ed, all employes in these districts hav ing abandoned their positions, with the exception of those employed at the isolated mine at Mocanauqua, where operations are continued with a reduced

In the Lehigh region the claim certain operators that they are working their mines full-handed is not borne ou when investigated. Employes of collieries where it is said the strike has no affected operations are to be seen by the dozens on the streets of Freelan and neighboring towns.
