WILL REVOKE FRANCHISES

Scranton Councils After Trolley Company.

Will Not Submit to Proposed Violation of Contract. Action Taken on the Matter Last Evening.

ter Last Evening.

Large crowds attended last evening's special meetings of Scranton select and common councils, held to take action on the recent order of the Scranton Railway Company abolishing its systems of transfers. The attorney for the company was present and suggested that a committee of councils be appointed to wait upon the officers of the company and that pending the report of the company is weakening before public clamor had no effect on councils. Select Councilman Vaughan introduced a resolution instructing the company to continue its system of transfers, and if it refused directing the city solicitor to take steps to have the company's franchises revoked.

"There is no need for a conference committee in this case," said Mr. Vaughan. "We have a contract with this company which it tells us in the most insulting and outrageous manner it will ignore after January 15. There is nothing for us to do but protect our interests and the way te do that is to pass this resolution."

The resolution passed both branches of council with a rush.

Meeting of Council.

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Council met Wednesday evening. The reports of the borough officers were accepted, after which a discussion followed on the price paid per meal for feeding prisoners. Finally a motion reducing the price from 25 to 15 cents prevailed.

A proposition from the Hazleton Machinery and Supply Company to sell a fire engine to the borough for \$1,000 was read. It was decided to bring the engine here and give it a test on the Hill, which is sadly in need of protection.

The Citizens' Hose Company asked to to reimbursed for a stove owned by the firemen which council sold for \$2.50. The stove was valued at \$5. The matter was referred to the building committee.

Thomas Gould was exonerated from the payment of borough taxes.

High Constable John H. Shovlin tendered his resignation on account of council's refusal to give him a key to the lockup. The resignation was accepted.
