VIOLENT DEATH OF AGED MAN

Indications Point to Foul Murder by Robbers.

Wilkesbarre Had a Sensation Yesterday When the Body of Anthony Lindacher Was Found.

Anthony Lindacher, a well-known citizen of Wilkesbarre, was found dead in his kitchen yesterday afternoon, probably murdered. The discovery was made by Edward Kear, a neighbor of Lindacher. Mrs. Kaar had not seen the old man about the house as usual during the morning, and when her husband returned home she asked him to look Lindacher up.

He looked through the back widow and saw the old man lying on the floor. He climbed in and found Lindacher dead. In the bedroom a chair was overturned, but there were no other signs of violence. At the foot of the steps was a plain gold ring, which Lindacher always wore.

He was lying with his face to the kitchen door and had been dead some time. Over the left eye there were two cuts. The skull was crushed, but there were no other marks upon him except a redness of the knees, as if he had been dragged over the floor.

What the object of the murder, if murder it prove to be, was is not apparent, unless it was believed the old man had some money hidden away. His son and the neighbors say that he always carried a considerable sum of money with him.

rioting; Thomas Harcur, guilty of assault and battery with attempt to kill George Kelter, a deputy sheriff, by shooting him in the face; Stephen Gorgosky, George J. Rebenmeyer, Bertie Holla, John Urick and John Poligan, guilty each of assault and battery.

At a former trial Harcur was acquitted of the charge of shooting Ralph Mills. Argument for a new trial was fixed for the 26th inst.

Two Men Killed.

A telegram was received last evening by Mrs. John Brennan, of South Washington street, notifying her of the death of her step-brother, John O'Donnell, aged 21 years, of Mahanoy City. He was the victim of a mine accident yesterday afternoon.

A fall of coal caused a squeeze in the North Skidmore slant at North Mahanoy Colliery, killing Peter Entwistle and O'Donnell. George Hagerty received a fracture of his right leg.

The men were robbing pillars with Samuel and Herbert Noakes and William O'Brien when the accident occurred. Entwistle was caught under the first fall and O'Donnell was running along the gangway for help when it closed in on him. Noakes and O'Brien had a run for their lives, and escaped miraculously.

Will Be Appointed.

The application of S. DePiero for an appointment to a clerkship by the legislature has, through the efforts of Representative Haworth, been favorably considered by the ruling powers at the state capital, and it is given out from a reliable quarter that he has been selected for the position of transcribing clerk in the house of representatives.

Mr. DePiero is well fitted for the position and the selection pleases his large number of friends. The official list of appointments will not be announced until next week.

Dwellings Are Scarce.

Dwelling houses in town are at a premium, and upwards of fifty could be rented in a week if the houses could be had. There are many married men working here who cannot bring their families to town on account of the lack of empty dwellings.

There is a rich field for the investment of capital in the erection of good houses in Freeland, and if the town is ever to increase its population buildings must be provided to accommodate those who want to live here.

South Ward Divided.

In court on Wednesday the division of the South ward into two wards was confirmed absolutely and a decree authorizing the same was issued. The ward boundaries are the same as those of the former voting districts. The territory east of Centre street and south of Main street will hereafter be known as the Fifth and west of Centre and south of Main street will be known as the Sixth ward.

Death of a Child.

Sophia, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Young, died at the family residence on the Hill last evening. The child was aged 5 months and 27 days. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. Services will be conducted at the house and the remains will be taken via trolley to Jeannette, where the interment will be made.

Injuries Proved Fatal.

Paul Simons, of Sandy Run, who fell on the ice early last week and fractured a leg, died yesterday in the Miners' hospital. The deceased was a prominent man in Slavonian circles. The funeral will take place on Sunday. Interment at St. Ann's cemetery.

Injured at Highland.

Phoenix Ferio, a Lithuanian, was hurt this morning by a fall of coal in No. 2 mine, Highland. He sustained a compound fracture of the left leg below the knee. The injured man was taken to the Miners' hospital.

ROUND THE REGION.

Tamaqua police arrested Harry Dietrich, a Reading Railway brakeman, on the charge of the wholesale stealing of brass from the company. Dietrich admitted that he had been stealing brass from the company eleven months, during which time he had taken 6,681 pounds. Receipts were shown for \$567.87, which he had received for the stolen goods.

While Undertaker Lucas was preparing the body of George Strabo, who was killed in the mines at Mahanoy City, for burial, he felt a large lump inside the dead man's working shirt, and was amazed to find it a roll of bills, amounting to \$730. The money will be sent to the man's wife and children in Austria.

Robert Taylor, the Mahanoy City druggist who is charged with the attempted poisoning of his wife, formerly Mrs. Mary Meyers, of that town, is on trial at Pottsville. On the charge of murdering Elsie Meyers, his fourteen-year-old stepdaughter, by giving her poison, he will be tried later.

John J. Munro is in the county jail, a hopeless prisoner, sentenced to pay his wife \$22.50 a month and not having a cent in the world. He has been there six months. He says he expects to stay in jail all his life. Munro is an old man, who married a young wife, and he left her.

What the Miners Want.

The district convention of the Wyoming valley United Mine Workers, in session at Edwardsville this week, urged its executive committee to secure legislation giving the check weighman, who is appointed by the men, the same power as the one employed by the company, providing that the quantity of coal mined by each miner be computed by weight instead of by the car, and that coal inspectors be elected by the people, instead of by the state examining board.

Hereafter every union man in that region will possess a card, which, if he wants a position at another mine, he must present, to show that he is a union man. Unless he has such a card he cannot get employment.

A motion was carried that all members of the union will wear none but union made shoes. It was agreed to make a uniform fee for joining all locals in the district.
