FATAL END TO LONG ILLNESS John Leisenring, of Upper

Lehigh, Is Dead.

Former Congressman Succumbed to Disease in a Philadelphia Hospital Late Saturday Night.

Former Congressman John Leisen-ing, of Upper Lebigh, died in the University hospital, Philadelphia, late Saturday night. Death was due to a complication of heart and kidney roubles

and Dr. Evans were with bim when he died. John Leisenring was born June 13, 1853, in Ashton, now Lansford, Carbon county, Pa. He received a good educa-tion in the schools in Bethlehem, Pa., and Merchantville and Princeton, N. J. He then devoted himself to his profes-sion, that of a mining engineer, and be-came an extensive coal operator. His father was the owner of sor • valuable coal lands at Upper Lehigh and its immediate vicinity, and in time he became very wealthy. His son, John inherited the father's business traits. After he left college he became associat-ed with his father and elder brother, Edward, in mining. The firm was very successful.

was an earnest Republican, and He was an earnest Republican, and in 1804 he consented to become a candi-date for congress from the Twelfth dis-trict. He was elected to the Fifty-fourth congress, receiving 18,114 votes to 12,644 for W. H. Hines, his Demo-cratic competitor. He was appointed a member of the house committee on railways and canals, and mines and mining, when, by reason of his technical and practical knowledge of the subjects embraced he was when to

of his technical and practical knowledge of the subjects embraced, he was able to redder excellent service. After serving his term he refused despite urgent solicitations to accept a renomination, and retired to private life March 4, 1897. Although this one term in congress comprised all his public life, he continued to take an active interest in political affairs in the state, and in Luzerne county. ne county.

Mr. Leisenring made his residence at Mr. Leisenring made his residence at Jpper Lehigh. A the time of his death ne was president of the Upper Lehigh bal Company and a director of the doosic Mountain, Mt. Jessup, Silver frook and Midvalley companies. He ad heavy holdings in the Lehigh Coal nd Navigation Company and in a gold nine and cattle ranch in Montana. He ras also a director of several banks. Ils wealth is estimated at over \$1,000,-00.

Mr. Leisenring was married in 1885 to Miss Mary Simpson, of Mauch Chunk, who survives him. He leaves no chil-
