Secretary Dempsey, of the United Mine Workers, Believes Matters Will Be Adjusted Amicably.

"I do not think there is any reason for all of this talk about another big anthracite strike," said John T. Dempsey, of Scranton, last evening.

"The operators have not said they will not attend the conference at Hazleton in March, and we are hopeful that they will. If they do, I have not the slightest doubt but matters will be adjusted satisfactorily all around."

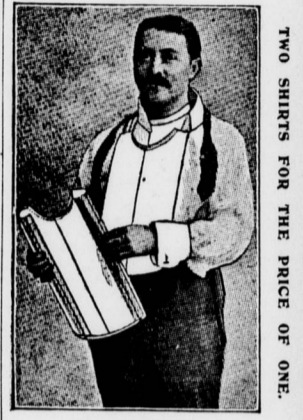
