INSURANCE FOR DRUGGISTS.

INSURANCE FOR DRUGGISTS.

Protected From Blackmall and Mistakes In Mixing Drugs.
One of the latest things in the fidelity and casualty line is to insure druggists against what is called the wrong prescription man. For \$15 or \$25 a year several companies down town guarantee druggists against damages arising from mistakes in compounding drugs. One of the most successful of these companies has 950 chemists of New York, Jersey City, Newark and New Haven on its list of subscribers. The idea of insuring druggists against loss from their own mistakes originated in the belief of a number of leading pharmacists that they were the victims of a gang of rogues who made a practice of pretending that wrong medicines had been given to some member of their families, sometimes with serious results. The gang was partly broken up by the fidelity company which first assumed the responsibility of protecting druggists at \$5 a year each. An officer of this company says that there are fully 1,000 mistakes a year in the compounding of drugs. "While there are so many genuine

"While there are so many genuthe mistakes," he continued, "there are many alleged errors in mixing medicines, and some of the complaints are invented for the sole purpose of extorting money from the retail druggists. Our company guarantees to protect druggists against themselves, but our main desire is to prevent fraud on the part of those who want to blackmail one of our clients for something he has not done.

"It is a serious matter to make a mistake in mixing drugs, but it is frequently even more serious to the druggist to have it noised about that such a mistake was made. I have known chemists to be forced out of business by the publicity given to the fact that they made a blunder. Dishonest persons have recognized the fear that druggists have of an exposure of this kind and have taken advantage of the knowledge.

"Since we undertook to protect them a number of druggists have confessed to paying big sums to persons who said instakes were made. I have the names of half a dozen so called doctors who have aided an east side gang that was engaged in the business of bleeding chemists.
"Still, there is nothing really remarkable in this protection of druggists.

She Toils and Ekes Out an Ex-istence on \$2.50 a Week.

I was left an orphan two years ago. I engaged in an east side factory for \$2.50 a week because I was unskilled, ant I am still working at the same wages. I get up at 5 o'clock in the morning. There is no heat in the house where I board. There are other girls in the house, and each one of us has some part of the work to do.

When I go to the kitchen, I scrub the floor. Then I run back to my room, put on my other dress, comb my hair, run back and get breakfast and then walk to the factory. The boarding house is near the factory, and I save 10 cents a day in ear fare. I am at the factory by 7 o'clock. I am tired when I begin, but I do not think of it any more than I can help.

At the noon hour I go to dinner. Factory girls do not kave luncheon. When I go to dinner I also help wait upon others and do a few chores, after which I hurry back to the factory. It is hurry, hurry, hurry.

At 6 o'clock the day's work at the factory is over and, weary enough, I go back to the boarding house.

After supper the dishes are to wash and put away, and some work is done to make ready for breakfast.

One morning in the week I get up before 5 o'clock and do my laundry before breakfast, for a factory girl who works for \$2.50 a week must wash and iron her own clothes. There is just one thing in this which helps to lighten the burden—a factory girl does not have many clothes, so the washing is light. I do my ironing in the evening after supper. I do my patching whenever I can. When Sunday for a walk. I have had it four years. A factory girl's dress cost a about 4 cents a yard, her stockings 10 cents, her shoes 50 cents or less. I have noe dress in which to appear when I go out on Sunday for a walk. I have had it four years. Another Knockout.

Union labor in New Haven got a setback by an opinion given to the bogrd of education by the corporation counsel, A. Heaton Robertson. Recently the court of common council, composed of the aldermen and councilmen of the city, passed a resolution ordering that all contracts hereafter issued by the board of education should contain clauses that only union workmen in good standing be hired on such contracts.

The board of education asked the corporation counsel if such contracts would be legal, and he reported they would not on the ground that such a clause would be unconstitutional, because it would prevent competition in bidding and would tend to create and recognize a privileged class. Such contracts would be void beyond question, he says. The corporation counsel concludes:

"But even if there was no such provision in the city charter the power to
discriminate in favor of union labor,
either by the court of common council
or the board of education, is beyond
the authority or scope of either board,
whether acting together or separately,

different departments of the city government in making contracts, as it
effectually ties their hands and prevents their availing themselves of opportunities to make advantageous
agreements in behalf of the city, and
any taxpayer, under these circumstances, would have a right to enjoin
the city from consummating such a
contract.
"This very question, whether a city
has a right in making contracts to discriminate in favor of union men, has
been decided by a number of courts,
and in every case the court has decided against such a right."
