## MOVEMENT IS SPREADING

**Workingmen Determined to Have Representation.**

**Organized Labor in All Parts of the State Preparing to Send Men of Their Own Selection to Harrisburg.**

The movement begun by the miners of the Fourth district to engage in political matters at the next election for members of the legislature, which was first mentioned in Friday's Tribune, is rapidly spreading to all parts of the state, and instead of the miners alone being engaged in looking after their interests it is quite probable that organized labor in general will enter the political field and insist that men chosen from the ranks of workers shall be selected as legislative candidates by both parties. Outside the mining regions there are several strongholds of laboring men, and, wherever the proper spirit of self-interest dominates, the movement to send workingmen to the next legislature has found a ready response.

The proposition of the miners, and the causes which led up to it, as outlined on Friday in these columns, has been favorably commented upon by the press of the whole state. In the bituminous region, especially, the miners are ready to throw their entire strength and influence with any plan which will secure miners better representatives at Harrisburg.

The only dissent so far heard has come from the professional politicians and rascals. These men are shrewd enough to see that their days of alleged usefulness will come to an end as soon as the movement assumes definite shape.

One of the amusing consequences of the publication of the miners' plans is the haste manifested by the present representatives in the legislature from the coal fields to show their friendship for the labor bills now before that body. For weeks these same men refused to even listen to the appeals of the miners' committees to secure them needed legislation; today they are threatening the machine-bosses with dire vengeance if the miners' bills are not passed. This death-bed repentance is not likely to fool the miners.

In addition to the candidacy of Congressman P. G. Gallagher for representative, who is an aspirant for the Democratic nomination, Hon. William R. Jeffrey, of Hazleton, has announced himself as an applicant for the Republican nomination in this district. Announcements of candidates in other districts are expected to be made in the near future.

There are mine bosses, superintendents and general utility men in our neighboring village who deserve attention from some quarter, and the object of the association, it is hoped, will be broad enough to include in its scope all of the above class who are void of humane feelings. If there were ever a town where human beings are bulldozed and coerced by corporation hirelings, it is Drifton, and an example of a few of the brutes cannot be made too soon.

### Will Issue Bonds.

At a meeting of Hazle township school directors last evening the board decided to issue bonds to the amount of \$17,000, to pay off the indebtedness of the school district. Owing to the under-valuation of the immense coal beds in the township, the finances of the district have not kept pace with necessary expenditures for many years past, and at the present time the district's indebtedness amounts to \$17,711.80.

The bonds are to bear 5 per cent interest, and to prevent any common persons from risking their money the denominations are to be \$500 each. After 1904 the board will redeem two bonds a year until 1921. School taxes will be increased to an amount which will provide for the interest and redemption of the bond issue.

### Cuban X Giants Coming.

At the Tigers park on Sunday afternoon the famous Cuban X Giants will try their strength against the Tigers. The visitors are colored ball players who have been on the road for many years and their annual appearance here is always greeted by an immense throng of people. They are No. 1 players and give an exhibition that is not surpassed by any team in the country.

The Tigers have selected an exceptionally strong club to appear against the Giants. The local battery will be Burns, of Chester, and McGeehan, of Drifton. Boner, of Chester, will also play with the Tigers, and every other point of the field will be well covered.

For the Giants Nelson and Williams will be the battery.

### Tomorrow's Exercises.

No change has been made in the program arranged for tomorrow by the committee of Maj. C. H. Cox Post. The graves of veterans in the out-of-town cemeteries will be decorated in the forenoon by delegations of Grand Army men.

In the afternoon the parade will form at 1:30 o'clock and after traversing the route published in the Tribune on Friday the closing exercises will be held at Freeland cemetery.

If the town is favored with good weather tomorrow, Memorial Day will be beautifully observed here.

### Guard Against Smallpox.

There is a feeling in town that council should take prompt measures to establish the Board of Health on a firm foundation. The prevalence and steady spread of smallpox in the upper end of the county ought to be guarded against by the local officials, and without an active Board of Health little or nothing can be done to prevent the introduction of the disease into town. With the coming of warmer weather the danger will be greater.

### No Deputies to Be Had Here.

An effort was made in Freeland yesterday by a Hazleton man to induce men here to go to Wilkesbarre to serve as deputies and guard the non-union machinists who have taken strikers' places in the Lehigh Valley shops in that city. It is said that several Hazleton men have accepted positions of this kind at the county seat. The emissary left town without securing a man to do the work required.

## FATAL ACCIDENT.

**William James, of Walnut Street, Killed Yesterday at Roan Yard.**

William James, a fireman on D. S. & S. engine 21, was instantly killed yesterday at noon in the railroad yard at Roan. He stepped from the tank of the engine to the brakewheel of the caboose, which he intended to enter to procure his dinner pail. His foot slipped, and before he could save himself he fell to the track below. The tank and engine passed over him and horribly mangled his body.

The remains were sent to Drifton and from there were brought to Undertaker Albert's establishment. At the latter place the body was dressed, but owing to the position in which Mr. James laid on the track the remains cannot be viewed by any one.

The young man was a native of Stockton and was aged 32 years, 7 months and 8 days. He was married in 1893 to Miss Carrie Haas, who, with four small children, the eldest being less than seven years old, survive him.

Mr. James was a popular young man and his sad death has caused much sympathy for his family. His wife and children are in very poor circumstances. The expenses occasioned by his death will be defrayed by subscriptions from his fellow-employees on the road and the business people of town.

The funeral will take place from his home on Walnut street at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon. Services will be held at St. John's Reformed church by Rev. J. B. Kerschner. The interment will be made at Freeland cemetery.

## ROUND THE REGION.

The new breaker of the Lehigh Valley Company, near Lost Creek, which is said to be the largest in the world, began work yesterday. Two years were required to build it. The cost was \$2,000,000. It will have a capacity of almost 6,000 tons a day. It is 250 feet square at the base and is 180 feet high.
